It has been warned that by 2050 as many as 1.2 billion people worldwide could be displaced as climate migrants. These climate migrants should have the "right to stay" rather than moving to abroad. Infrastructure development should be considered a powerful measure to ensure their "right to stay." The Maldives decided to build a new island called Hulhumalé, to move about half of the country's population to it. This session will present and discuss the reasons for the need to build Hulhumalé and how the people who have moved to Hulhumalé assess their living conditions.
